## Your views on the Local List

Please provide your comments here with reference to the asset.

Dear Sir, Madam,

Please find below the response from Claygate Parish Council to Elmbridge Borough Council's draft Local Heritage Asset Consultation:-

1. Telegraph Lane: Ivy Cottage (Building reference: EL091) is incorrectly identified.

Ivy Cottage is located at 41 Telegraph Lane, not 1 Telegraph Lane

2. The Description of Asset for Brick Pavements at Dalmore Avenue (Building reference: EL095) and Foley Road (Building reference: EL096) have been transposed.

- Dalmore Avenue brick pavements description should read:-

"Lengths of brick pavements, between Hare Lane and recreation ground (both sides of road)."

- Foley Road brick pavements description should read:-

"Lengths of brick pavements, between Claremont Road and Coverts Road (both sides of road)."

3. There are 10 buildings currently shown on the Elmbridge website under the heading "List Of Local Buildings Of Special Architectural Or Historic Interest (published in 2000 and updated in 2016)" that have been omitted from the "Draft List of Local Heritage Assets". These buildings have been on the Elmbridge Local List for over 20 years, and we request they are included in the "Draft List of Local Heritage Assets" as there is no apparent reason for their omission.

These buildings are:-

- i) Beaconsfield Road: 12 (High Clare), 20 (Manor House) and 26 (Devoncroft)
- ii) Claremont Road: 3 to 9 (odd nos)
- iii) Foley Road: 47 (Wyndgates), 51 (White Springs) 57 (Foley Lodge)

4. 13 Buildings submitted by Claygate Parish Council for consideration as Locally Listed Buildings in the 2021 Consultation have not been included in the "Draft List of Local Heritage Assets". We request that these buildings are reconsidered for inclusion in the "Draft List of Local Heritage Assets"

The omitted buildings are:-

- i) Common Road: 41 (Alma Cottage)

Built in the 1850s this property has a strong Historical Association and retains some Architectural Value.

Formerly The Alma, a coach house, named after the Battle of Alma which took place during the Crimean War in 1854. Converted to a cottage 1911. Retained some original internal architecture and is within an established conservation area. The layout of the site still captures the feel of the stables.

- ii) Telegraph Lane: Sun Insurance Fire Mark (at Slough Farm)

Dated 24th April 1792 this has Rarity Value and Historical Association.

Before postal services and formal addresses were widespread, fire marks were

displayed on buildings to identify properties that were insured. This is a rare example of a fire mark at its original location. Many fire marks are now either in museums or no longer exist.

iii) The Green: Sims Cottages (1 to 8)

Built in 1880s these properties have Group Value, Historical Association, Architectural Value and Landmark Status.

The surrounding area remains a central location for events such as Christmas Carols that are held here every year - a tradition for many decades. These properties contribute to identifying this area as the original centre of Claygate.

iv) The Green: Sydney Cottages (1 to 3)

Built in 1880s these properties have Group Value and Historical Association.

These properties contribute to identifying this area as the original centre of Claygate.

Formerly site of 4 shops burned down in "Great Fire of Claygate" in October 1895.
